Altruism: thinking for the good of others

Examples: Help others, share, listen, understand and accept differences, collaborate, compromises...etc.

associated with: globally minded, respectful, open-mined, kindhearted, caring, sympathetic,

thoughtful...etc.

It is Biblical: Philippians 2:1-17

Egocentrism: inability to take on other people's perspective, ideas, and beliefs Piaget's Theory of Mind - the Three Mountains Task

Examples in your own home:

Learning to be Altruistic

How do children learn behaviors? (Bandura's Bobo Doll Experiment - Social Learning Theory)

- **1. Modeling -** model the behaviors you want to see. What behaviors do you exhibit at home? How will you show altruism at home?
- 2. Point It Out tell your child what you see. Which behaviors do you point out at home? What do you see your spouse or your child do?
- 3. Role Playing / Training what will you do with your children to help them to be altruistic.
